Clean-Up Ideas

1. Give a Warning

Flash the Lights: Pre-teach that flashing the lights means it is almost time for clean-up.



Set a Timer: Tell the class how many minutes until clean-up.

Use a Sound Cue: Examples include bell, shaker, rainstick, drum, triangle, kazoo, harmonica, or a clean-up song on tape or cd.

2. Give a Direction

"First... Then...": First... Then... directions prepare children for the transition by telling them what is next and giving them a destination.

Assign Roles or Areas: Give children specific clean up tasks or a specific area of the room to clean up.

Give Toys to Clean Up: Place toys in children's hands to help them get started cleaning up.

Sing a Clean-up Song: Pre-teach that the clean-up song means it is time to start cleaning up.



Play "Beat the Clock": Turn clean-up into a race game.

Model & Assist: Participate in clean-up with the children.

3. Reinforce!

Cruise & Praise: Wander the room and praise children who are cleaning up. Make it fun by wearing funny glasses, using binoculars, or wearing a clean-up cape or an inspector badge. Or, make "clean-up inspector" a classroom job and have a child look for friends who are cleaning up.

Thank-you Song: To the tune of "Goodnight, Ladies" or "The Hello Song" Thank you, (name), thank you (name), thank you (name) for cleaning up our room.

Sticker Charts: Give stickers to children who are cleaning up, or put them on individual or classroom sticker charts.

Farn Classwide Party: Put a scoop of beans, marbles, or popcorn in a jar when children are cleaning to show progress toward the classwide goal of a popcorn or other party.
